We started off our summer with our annual D16 Rendezvous in Poulsbo. We had 11 boats and others arriving by car to have about 60 in attendance. The weekend was busy with Dock-tails, Flare Practice, Fire Extinguisher Practice, and a Co-op Charting tutorial followed by a Geodetic Marker hunt and an Aids to Navigation survey exploration on-the-water. Also, in the first time in 5+ years we held a Boat Operator Certification session. The weekend was capped off by our catered dinner at the Poulsbo Yacht Club. We were able to have a presentation from the Coast Guard and a lively auction of amazing items donated by our squadrons and district. Speaking of fun.... I joined Steve and Barbara Erickson for a Geodetic Marker Adventure. While on an RV trip to beautiful Montana with our RV friends the Ericksons, Martins, and Johnsons, we decided to look for some markers near our location in Columbia Falls. Montana does not have a squadron, so we decided to bring USPS to the area and do some looking. With the help of an app called Benchmark Hunter, we identified four survey markers in the area. Of the four, we were able to locate one which had last been recorded in 2016. The other three have not been located since 1979. We used the available information provided by the National Survey Data Explorer through NOAA. The data sheet included a description of where the mark was last found. The descriptions provided did not match the current landscape although the GPS coordinates were close. To further validate the possible location, Steve Erickson spoke to the business owners and determined that there had been multiple changes in

the ground where the markers were originally documented. Despite only finding one, it was great fun and a neat way to see an area of Montana.

For those of you who have not participated in a Co-op Adventure, check it out. It makes a great squadron outing.

Happy August. Although as I sit here typing, the temperature is a cloudy 70°, the thermometer has topped out this week at 92°, and I have seriously considered breaking out the Air Conditioner.

As some of you may know, my day job office sits on the Ship Canal between the Fremont bridge and Seattle Pacific University. I have the pleasure of watching all manner of vessels pass along the canal, from UW Rowers to enormous fishing and construction boats guided by Tug and Tow boats. Since the weather really turned in June, the traffic on the canal has steadily increased, and though I can't prove it objectively, I believe the proportion of pleasure craft has also increased significantly. When I walk the Canal Trail at lunch, I often wonder how many of those operators could benefit from our ABC and Advance Grade classes. Especially with rowing sculls so prominent at this time of year. It's a shame we can't post an advertisement along the canal with our contact information. The good news is, USPS/America's Boating Club is still a thriving organization, and we are still reaching out to the recreational boating community, both new and seasoned boaters. I have received notifications that Everett, Bellingham, and Tacoma are planning ABC classes this fall, as well as Advance Grade classes in both virtual and live venues. 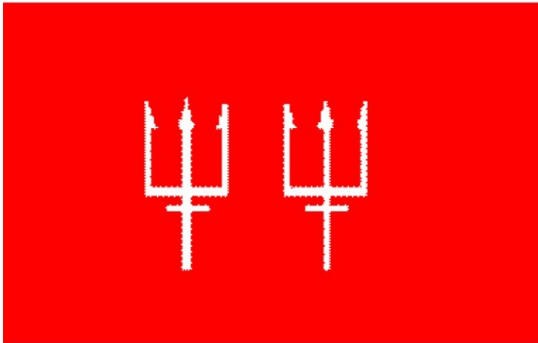

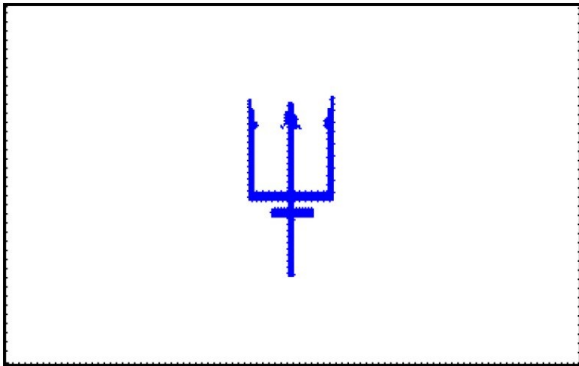

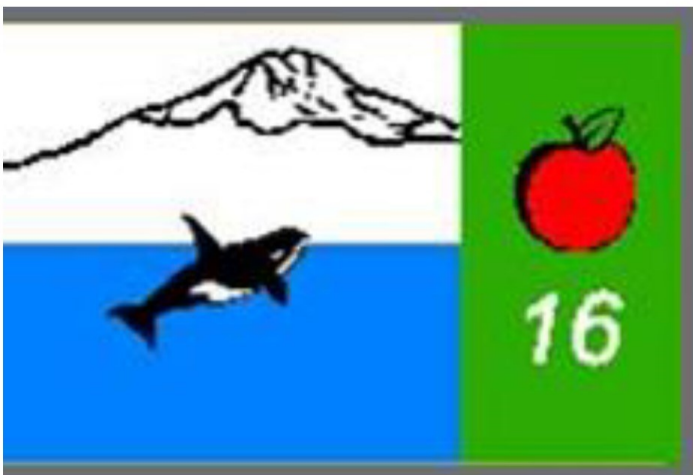

This extended cruise agenda is designed to get our local squadrons involved in a District 16 cruise in addition to:

- 1) Challenging D/16 members in the many different aspects of cruise planning.
- 2) Since this is October, weather will dictate the final agenda. Locations can change based on weather severity and direction.
- 3) The first six days are RV accessible and require no ferry trips.
- 4) The cruise pauses two nights in Friday Harbor for the D/16 Fall Conference at the San Juan Island Yacht Club on Saturday October 7.

After the D/16 Conference, we will head around San Juan Island, down the backside to the South end of Lopez Island for some days at anchor. Those who complete the cruise will have circumnavigated both San Juan and Lopez Islands and visited some of the highlights of the San Juan Island group.

The cruise will challenge you with the following:

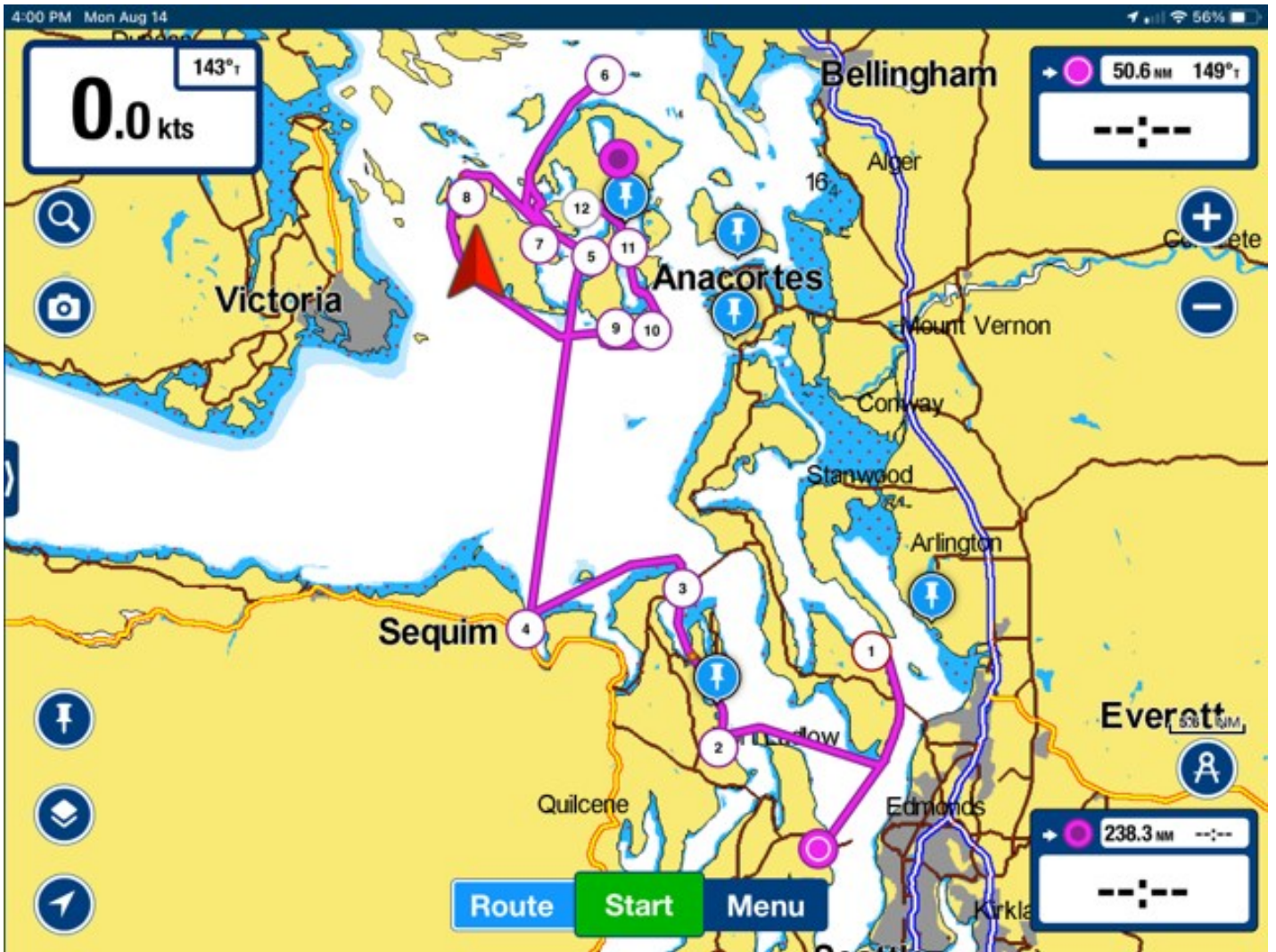
- 1) The logistics of attending, coming and going, from a long cruise (188nm).
- 2) Working around and anticipating weather conditions by working with fellow cruisers.
- 3) Crossing Puget Sound and the shipping lanes and dealing with Cattle Pass.
- 4) Anchoring and rafting when docks are available. Every location has access to a beach or dock for doggie relief.
- 5) Managing onboard resources such as water and waste.
- 6) Group gathering and doggie relief where your skiff is the only transportation.

NOTE: Attend this cruise. You can't teach or talk about cruising if you have never done it!

BOATING SAFETY 4KIDS NEEDS YOUR HELP!!!

Boating Safety 4 Kids is what Everett does well. There is an event in Ballard on September 30th that we partnered with Seattle back in 2019. It was a blast! We are signed up to do it again this year.

The event is called Fishermen's Fall Festival. Its mission is to provide a free community event with the focus on family fun bringing awareness to Fishermen's Terminal and its retail businesses, promote the commercial seafood industry and the North Pacific Fishing Fleet and bring awareness to the positive economic impact on commercial seafood industry and Fishermen's Terminal provides to the local economy. Also, to spotlight the benefit the Seattle Fishermen's Memorial and the services it provides to the commercial seafood industry including but not limited to safety and bereavement issues with all proceeds going to the memorial. The festival is a non-profit fund-raising event funded through donations from the commercial seafood industry, Port of Seattle, Fishermen's Terminal tenants and various local businesses.

In 2019 the Boating Safety 4 Kids booth gave out Passports to the kids coming by the booth. They had to complete three activities to receive a color book. There was also time to talk to the parents regarding boating safety and get them signed up for classes and Vessel Safety Checks. We had over 10 volunteers at the event from the Everett and Seattle Squadrons, and we reached over 80 kids that afternoon.

Andy Gregory, the Sr. Program Manager, at Fishermen's Terminal loved our plan because it keeps the kids engaged and teaches them water safety.

We are looking for volunteers from Everett, Seattle, and Bellevue Squadrons to come and help with the Life Jacket Style Show, Buckles in the Ice Chest, and the Rescue Line Toss activities. We need a greeter to give the kids the Passports. We need a person to give out the color books at the end of the activity. We need people to talk to the parents and other boaters.

Are you willing and able on Saturday, September 30th? There will be two 4-hour shifts if we get enough helpers. Setup begins at 10 am and tear down is after 6pm.
